ABOUT THE SHOW

Barbu delves into the origins of the circus in Montreal at the end of the 19th and beginning of the 20th century. Imagine a fairground where spectators are left spellbound by remarkable performances and outrageous feats, simple curiosities and unexpected eccentricities. Political correctness has no place in the mayhem of this show. In scene

after scene where music, video, circus and general craziness collide, each performer wows the audience with a showcase of spectacular skills. May the best beard win! Backed by a frenetic electro-trad band, the Cirque Alfonse clan strays dangerously.

ABOUT THE COMPANY

Cirque Alfonse brings together the Carabinier-Lépine family with some of their friends and derives its name from Saint-Alphonse-Rodriguez, the family's native municipality in Lanaudière Québec. In each of their productions, Cirque Alfonse draws upon Québecois folklore for their themes, with the company adding their own distinctive modern touch.

Cirque Alfonse has captured the hearts the audiences since the creation of their production Timber in 2011, their production with a Québecois lumberjack theme. They followed up with Barbu in 2014, inspired by the Montreal carnivals at the end of the 19th century. The company has toured the globe several times with these productions. In 2017, Cirque Alfonse created Tabarnak, a show based on the sacred and the profane as a circus "high mass". In 2021, Cirque Alfonse revisits the agricultural world with Animal, the farm gone haywire!
